Five Reasons Health Care Reform DOES Fund Abortion

Louisiana Right to Life Federation provides five reasons ***abortion IS federally funded under all current forms of health care reform:***

1. ***The Hyde Amendment Does NOT Apply:*** Simply put, the Hyde Amendment, originally adopted in 1976, is a limitation attached to the annual budget of Medicaid that prevents the funding of abortion in Medicaid. The Hyde Amendment is not a government-wide policy, and since reform legislation establishes new funding streams, the Hyde Amendment does not apply.
2. ***The Media Says So Themselves:*** An AP story dated August 5 entitled “Gov’t Insurance would Allow Coverage for Abortion” accurately states the scenario:

A law called the Hyde Amendment applies the restrictions to Medicaid ... *The health overhaul would create a stream of federal funding not covered by the restrictions.* [E.A.]

In addition, a FactCheck.org article from August 21 entitled “Abortion: Which Side is Fabricating” stated, “*Despite what Obama said, the House bill would allow abortions to be covered by a federal plan and by federally subsidized private plans.*”
3. ***Pro-Life Amendments Defeated in Committee:*** In both the House Energy and Commerce Committee and the Senate HELP Committee, ALL pro-life amendments explicitly excluding abortion funding have been defeated.
4. ***H.R. 3200 Directly Includes Abortion:*** The Capps Amendment to H.R. 3200, passed in the House Energy and Commerce Committee on July 30, *added abortion to the bill* by explicitly sanctioning the public plan to cover all elective abortions and allowing federal subsidies to help the purchasing of private plans covering abortion.
5. ***“Not Excluded” means “Included”:*** When Roe v. Wade made abortion legal in 1973, a Medicaid panel declared abortion an “essential benefit” covered through Medicaid. Congress did not have to sanction the inclusion of abortion. Therefore, federal funding of abortion was not restricted until Congress explicitly excluded it with the Hyde Amendment in 1976. Even if abortion is not “written” into reform legislation as the Capps Amendment does in H.R. 3200, government panels would later include abortion as an “essential benefit.”

As indicated clearly from the points above, unless amendments (similar to Hyde) that explicitly exclude abortion coverage are passed, reform legislation would sanction the government funding of abortion for the first time in this country since 1976.

Louisiana Right to Life Federation asks Louisiana’s Congressional Delegation to vote “no” on health care reform legislation that does not explicitly exclude abortion funding.
